For those who can respond, the vast majority are confirmed to still be eligible. This suggests that many children (65,000 in 2019) lost coverage they most likely are eligible to receive.

Meanwhile, most of the children who are removed from Medicaid miss those important regular checkups and immunizations in their first years of life. This results in long-term costs, both for children and for their communities. Missed doctor appointments often mean missed time in school due to preventable illnesses. protracted, There's also the loss of income for parents who need to care for sick children, and increased administrative burdens for the state, doctors, insurance companies and families.

Instead, a 12-month continuous eligibility cycle, which begins the renewal process at the 10-month mark, will provide better healthcare for children and is a better investment of resources.

- More than 660,000 uninsured Texans are eligible for Medicaid but not enrolled.
- \succ 85% of those Texans are children.
- The best way to decrease the number of uninsured is to provide continuous eligibility in Medicaid for kids.
- 12 month continuous eligibility was broadly supported last session in the House by a bi-partisan group of members.
