The TCHS panel, "To Heal and Sustain: Building Catholic Health Care Ministry in



Remembering Liz Makowski

Dr. Elizabeth: "Liz" Mary Makowski, a long-time member of TCHS passed away on Tuesday, September 7th in San Marcos, Texas.

Dr. Makowski served on the editorial board of the Catholic Southwest from 1996 to 2016. When she wrote an article in 1996 for Catholic Southwest, the journal editor, Patrick Foley, commented on the article saying, "This thoughtful essay ... marks Professor Makowski as a scholar of considerable depth regarding the study of female religious." This is but one example Makowski's colleagues' high regard for her academic scholarship.

Liz Makowski was born in 1951, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and graduated from Milwaukee High School. She earned a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in 1973 and a Master of Arts in 1976. She went on to earn an A.M. in History from Harvard University in 1977, and a Doctorate in History from Columbia University in 1993.

She was a Professor of History at Texas State University from 1993 until 2019 and taught medieval and Church history in the history department and in the honors program. She focused on the study of medieval nuns and was known for her contributions to the history of women in the Middle Ages.

She was the author of five widely acclaimed books on medieval culture, and in 2007, she won Notre Dame University's History of Women Religious Distinguished Book Award. She



was a talented and inspiring teacher, a thoughtful mentor, and an accomplished scholar with a passion for history. We will miss her as a member of TCHS.

Msgr. James Vanderholt, An Appreciation


Msgr. James Vanderholt was born September 4, 1932, Charles and Helen Vanderholt. After high school, he entered the diocesan seminary in La Porte, Texas. He attended St. Anthony Elementary and High School, graduating in 1949. He was ordained by Bishop Nold on May 25, 1957. He obtained a bachelor's degree from Lamar University and went on to obtain four masters' degrees in addition to a Doctorate in Ministry from San Francisco Theological Seminary. Annunciation Parish in Houston was his first assignment as a parochial vicar. He was also chaplain of the Catholic Women's Club. He spent the first nine years of his priesthood serving within the Galveston-Houston diocese. He transferred to the Beaumont diocese in 1966.

Vanderholt was known as an author, educator, and historian. He wrote the history of St. Mary's Seminary at La Porte. Msgr. Vanderholt coauthored the history of the Beaumont diocese: The Diocese of Beaumont, the Catholic Story of Southeast Texas. He also penned Lone Star Catholicism: A Measure of Faith: from the Spanish Missions to the Golden Anniversary of the Diocese of Austin. He also wrote columns in the Beaumont Cath-Vanderholt paper. served as President of the Texas Catholic Historical Society from 2002 till 2004 and became a Fellow within the Society in 2016.

Msgr. Vanderholt's love of history in no way hindered his service to the Galveston-Houston or the Beaumont diocese. As an educator he taught at Incarnate Word Academy in Houston. Later, he instructed students at Kelly High School. He went on to teach at Dominican College, Lamar University, and Incarnate Word College. He served as Director of the Beaumont Diocesan School Office from 1966 1975. In 1988. Fr. Vanderholt became a member of the faculty preparing permanent deacon candidates.

Bishop Bernard Ganter appointed Fr. Vanderholt Director of Communications in August of 1981 and executive editor of the *East Texas Catholic*. Under his leadership the Beaumont diocese began Sunday television shows on Labor Day weekend of 1982. The Communications Office also sponsored radio programs.

In 1974, Fr. Vanderholt became part of an ecumenical endeavor to minister in a center for seamen. A Baptist, two Methodists, a rabbi, the director of the Port of Port Arthur and Fr. Vanderholt opened a center in a seventy-foot mobile home. Five years later the Port Arthur



International Seamen's Center materialized in a facility more than seven thousand feet larger. Msgr. Vanderholt also held down the fort as the pastor of numerous parishes. It was frequently stated that Msgr. James Vanderholt was much more than a parish priest. That is quite evident from his variety of ministries and the richness he brought to those he served.

Msgr. Vanderholt enjoyed his retirement years at Pope John XXIII Home for Retired Priests. He passed away on August 11, 2021, at the age of 88. His brother priests from the Beaumont diocese called him "home" to be buried from St Anthony Cathedral Basilica in Beaumont.
